So instead of hiding from the laughter and excitement I will embrace it. I'm coming Matt. I am just a little slower than I was. Don't worry about that limp. Hold my hand. The lake is just over the hill.



Letting Go of Pain

"It just isn't right! I go a month, sometimes, and don't cry. I actually get involved in something and don't think about my daughter for hours. I had fun at the company picnic last week. I feel so guilty. Am I forgetting my daughter?"

The mother who said this to me was two years into her grief. She was doing good griefwork...leaning into the pain, talking out her feelings, expressing emotions and attending Bereaved Parents meetings. But was she hurting less?

When parents begin to reap the harvest of griefwork well done, they fear they are losing their children. The truth is that they are doing just that...reaping the harvest of their griefwork well done. In the first couple of years, pain ties us to our children. During that time we equate pain with love. By the time we are beginning to resolve our grief, and that is what is happening, the pain has been our companion for so long we feel lost without it. This is one of the few places in grief where our minds need to take over for a while. We need to look at the illogic of prolonged grieving. We need to see that we are beginning to reach the goal we had hoped someday to reach.

Self talk can help us rid ourselves of this illogical emotion. Ask yourself...

- If you believe that to keep your child in your heart for the rest of your life is wrong?
- Will your prolonged misery make your child any less dead?
- Does the fact that your child has died mean you must die also?
- Does your prolonged misery accomplish anything?
 What purpose does it serve?
- Will hanging onto your pain make you grow and change; or will it make you unhappy and bitter?
- What effect will your prolonged grief have on your marriage and/or surviving children?
- Do you really want to stay in the pit of grief indefinitely?
- Will your continuing pain honor your child?

These questions can help you see that beginning grief resolution is as healthy and normal, after a couple of years, as allowing yourself to enter into your grief in the early months after your child died.

Rethink your reactions. Let yourself get to the other side of your grief. Let yourself appreciate the peace and comfort that is beginning to be yours. Most importantly, let yourself feel the joy of remembering your child without the deep searing pain you have felt for so long.

The Three R's of Grief's School

Elementary school does not have exclusive rights to the three R's; grief's school has its basic three R's as well. Though they differ, each is important.

The first R stands for Rights—and you do have rights. Among them is the right to grieve in your own unique way and at your own pace. If you are one of those who needs the company of others so much you are willing to try to please them when they play the old "pretend you're okay" game, I hope you will decide no one is that important. Don't play that game. If your friends and acquaintances can't be there for you when you are hurting, then decide not to play pretend games just to have them near. As a grieving parent, you have the right to lament and be weak when you child dies; conversely, you also have the right to recover.

The second R is Responsibility. It isn't fair, and much of life isn't, but those of us who are grieving find ourselves responsible for maintaining the important relationships in our lives. If the people involved, no matter how close, haven't experienced the death of one of their children, they don't understand your needs as you struggle to survive. It is important for you to remember back to your own inadequacies before your tragedy occurred. I suspect you didn't know what to say or do to comfort a grieving parent either. Now that you have been on both sides of that grief fence, it is up to you to educate the people who care for you about the appropriate ways for them to go about supporting and helping you to survive. If you are married, responsibility comes into play again, for you and your spouse are each responsible for recognizing the differences in the way men and

women typically grieve. By doing so, you better ensure the survival of your marriage during this stressful time. Certainly you don't have to do your grief work as anyone else thinks you should; on the other hand, you don't have the right to demand anyone else do it your way either. You must choose to care for your marriage and the other important relationships in your life.

The third R stands for Reinvestment. Here the other two R's also play a part, for it is your right and responsibility to choose to reinvest not only your energy and interest in life as it is for you now, but also your love in those you have left who care for you. It's a temptation to withdraw affection, hoping this act will protect you from ever being hurt this badly again by another loss. It doesn't work, for the love is still there whether you admit it or not, and all such an act accomplishes is to deny you the comfort of the warmth of good relationships. You must choose to value what you have left as much as what you have lost, and by so doing. reinvest wisely in your future.

Yes, the school of grief's three R's differ from elementary school's Reading, 'Riting, and 'Rithmetic, but how well you learn your assignments in each case determines the quality of your life in the years ahead. I hope you will give grief's lessons your full attention so you will travel far and well on the road to recovery.

Compassion is not an easy task, but it is among the greatest gifts we can give to each other.


