The Rabbit Hole

Viewing a movie like "The Rabbit Hole" is not exactly date night entertainment. I knew what to expect, I had seen the Pulitzer Prize winning play a few years ago and I was hoping that it would be a positive step in the education of the non-bereaved. I fear that it probably reinforced many common misunderstandings about our world as bereaved parents.

The story opens only 8 months after a "perfect couple," had their lives destroyed. Their 4 year old son ran after the family dog and was killed by a teenage driver. It was clearly an accident. They are beyond hope.

The emptiness of their new life was painful to watch. I remember those days. Each parent, totally immersed in their own pain, hoping to exist without hurting the other one. The early days of grief can be very self-centered. We frequently parrot, "Everyone grieves in their own way." Of course that means everyone except our spouse and we want them to do it our way! This couple was no exception; their coping methods were quite different.

They try attending a support group, which is unfortunately portrayed in a very negative light. She is completely turned off by the self-righteous comment, "God needed another angel," Neither one of them can believe that they might still be grieving after 8 years like another couple in the group that tries, unsuccessfully, to relate to them.. Very little about this assembly would encourage anyone to return, let alone find comfort or hope.

Each of them stumbles through their own grief journey. Do we display his belongings? Do we sell the house? Can we befriend the young man who was the driver? Can the death of her heroin addicted brother be compared to the loss of 4 year old Danny? Do we reach out to those friends who have abandoned us?

This is Hollywood though and the first two years of grief are wrapped up in less than two hours.

As bereaved parents we know that peace in our new normal is possible but it takes lots of time and work to emerge from the rabbit hole.

One Word.....Courage

I will not tell you that you are strong. I know you don't feel strong. A single word could bring you to your knees. I will not tell you that I admire you. I know you don't feel admirable. More like confused and hurting; falling down a deep, dark hole.

What I will tell you though, is that you have courage. Courage you may not have recognized in yourself. Whenever you open a book on grief, read a magazine article on grief, attend a support group or talk about your grief, you have courage. Whenever you positively express your suffering, you have courage. When you got out of bed but didn't want to, got dressed, went to work or took care of other children and then made it to the end of your day, you found courage. Courage that you probably thought you never had. Courage that you never wanted to know you had; but courage that you now have.

Courage is not easy to find, let alone keep. But it can be found; it can be kept. During those horrible days when you may think you're going to die, keep courage firmly in front of you. When your pain is overwhelming, keep courage firmly in your heart. Courage is where your healing lives.

The opportunities to find courage are many, if we pay attention. When you went to the grocery store, even if you collapsed on the floor at the sight of your child's favorite food, but made it back home, you found courage. When you looked through photo albums of your child and cried and cried, you found courage. When you spoke their name, told their story and allowed yourself to grieve, you found courage. Courage born can never die. Courage found can never be lost.

It can be difficult to wake up every day and find courage. The devastation from our child's death is like nothing we've ever experienced. Words like happy, smiles, laughter, meaning and joy are concepts in a distant reality we think we will never know again. So when you hear a bereaved parent talk about the return of their smile, or how they've found meaning again, let that give rise to your courage. Try and have an attitude that says, "If it can happen for them, maybe, just maybe, it can happen for me." It's true, it can happen for you, it's happened for thousands of parents who did their work and didn't let death win. Bring courage into your life and it will bring along its partners of hope, a positive attitude and the desire for a better day.

Death's not as powerful as it thinks it is if we don't let it be. Death took our children's bodies. That's huge, but that one thing is all death took. Death can never take their life force, our memories or our love. Those three things all belong to their lives. Our kids win, three to one. Death did not take all. Always remember that for our children to have died, they first had to have lived, no matter how long that was. If we focus on their living and let go of their dying, it's possible to bury their death and give birth to their life. Our kids can live again, not like we want them to live, but in the best way we let them live.

It's very hard, it takes great courage, to let go of parts of our past. We all want one more hug, one more kiss and one more chance to talk to our children. We all want tomorrow with them. Sadly, those are unchangeable events. Letting go of those desires, that part of our past is where we can find our greatest healing. It takes time to find that release and it takes courage to search for it. Don't stop searching.

Hope is one of courage's greatest allies. Hope is why we get out of bed each day. Hope tells us that our lives can improve. If we pay attendtion, hope can be found in many places and in many ways. It takes courage to allow ourselves to take hope in, to let it heal us, to let us find a better day. Here's my acronym for hope. H.O.P.E. - Healing Opportunities are Possible Everyday. Hope can be found in the smallest of things like seeing the sun shine when we raise our blinds in the morning. Hope can be found in the grandest

of things like the wonderful memories of our children. Those memories are of living, laughing, loving children. They are not memories of a dead child; they are memories of a living child.

A belief that our lives will (not just can) get better, is called a positive attitude. An attitude that says, "I want to feel better, I believe I can feel better and I'll do my work to make that happen." To maintain a positive attitude in my life I've written morning and evening afirmations. They remind me that even though a horrible thing has happened to me and my son, not all of life is horrible. There are many good things, good people and good opportunities in my life. It's important to my healing for me to keep in mind that I'm a blessed father for the time I had with my son in my arms, and for the time I will always have him in my life and in my heart.

We're all experiencing the greatest challenge we will probably ever know. The death of our children is an event like no other. But as deep as our pain has been, or still is, we cannot let death win. We cannot let our child's death overshadow their life; death cannot have all of our children.

In our greatest adversity we find our greatest strength; in that strength we find our greatest healing. We will forever grieve the death of our kids, but it doesn't mean we have to lead a grief stricken life. Courage tells us that.

From your editor....

Every once in a while we hear a story that instills hope. With saddened hearts my husband and I attended a memorial for one of my younger cousins who died from cancer in December. At the memorial his sister retold stories from his last days that I will keep in my heart as reminders of the hope that is there for us. My cousin Bob had been on hospice about a month when he called his sister at work and said that there were angels in his room with him. She left work and rushed to his house and again he said, "There is someone in the room watching over us.... angels." Several days later he was in his final hours and he called out, "Mom!" (His mom died in the late 1970s while Bob was still in high school.) Finally, as he was dying, the last words he said were, "It's amazing!"

Bob loved the outdoors, lived simply and was a kind soul. Because of this I wholeheartedly believe that he was giving his sister, and now us, insight into the beauty of the hereafter. His surviving sibling, my cousin Mary, by sharing this story has given us a gift. I have heard others tell that our loved ones are there to meet us when we die, but having this story told in my family makes it even more personal and real to me.

I live in hope of my son waiting for me with open arms when it is my time. I also believe heaven will be "amazing". Thank you, Bob, for opening up the veil between here and there to fill our lives with hope!

May you all hear stories of hope that make life here on earth more bearable....

These families then receive a basket of food, as well as toys, to use as Christmas gifts for the children of the household. We also are using some of the toys for rewards for perfect attendance during the first semester of school.

Who am I now that my sibling has died? I have asked myself that question many times over the last four years. When I think of my brother, Sean, I think of how things used to be. I also think of all the things that he will miss. For example, my husband or my children will never know Sean. Sean will never have children. There are just so many things that he will miss.

I began to question who I was about a month after Sean died. He and I shared a great love of music. When I think of music, I think of Sean. As first, every song I heard made me cry. After a while though, I began to try to find a deeper meaning in the songs. I know that a lot of teenagers and young adults identify important times in their lives by music. I am one of those people. Now I am trying to figure out what place the music has in my life. After Sean died, music took on new meaning for me. The music I sing and listen to is my special connection to my brother. The song, "Because You Loved Me" by Celine Dion was especially powerful for me.

I came to realize that through simply loving and supporting me, my brother had helped to shape the person that I was becoming and who I want to become. I have realized now that my life's direction has taken a slight detour. I have had to reroute my image of myself. When I see music, I see my brother and I hope that will never change. When I saw myself in the past, I saw Sean by my side. That picture has now been altered. The biggest part of the question, "Who am I now?" is also "Am I still a sister?" The answer to that is a simple yes! Sean will always be my brother and I will be his sister. Forever. ##
