I recently had an experience that touched my heart and I wanted to share it with you. I have a new job as general manager of a private tennis club. My first week at the club, I met a member know to all as "Old Bill". Bill is 92 and perfectly independent and active. He comes to the club most every Friday, enjoys lunch and weather permitting, a game of tennis. "Old Bill" likes to talk, and we became fast friends. He told me how he had lost his wife a few years back and how he misses her, particularly so, he said, because it was just the two of them. Bill then went on to tell me that they had lost their only child when she was 8 1/2. He asked if the story was boring me; I assured him it was not, because I, too, had lost my only child.

Bill then sat down and told me the story of his little Shirley's life and death, just as we all tell our stories. He had the same need to tell it again as we all do. But he told it with pride and joy blended with the sorrow of his loss. "She was a beauty" he said, "and bright as a button." If she had lived, she would be 70 years old today, she's been gone 62 years. In turn, I told him of Sandy.

Though I cried for Bill's loss of Shirley as I do for all of us, I was comforted by the confirmation that, while decades pass, our children are never forgotten. I'll now know of a little girl named Shirley, who will always be loved and never forgotten by her dad, and as I pass this story along, you too, will know "Old Bill's little Shirley." ##

## Treasure Bears

My daughter had asked me what I was doing on Saturday, October 15<sup>th</sup>; she wanted to do a Mother/Daughter time with me. She took me for breakfast, and then we proceeded to go to her church, Wheatland Salem Church, 1852 95<sup>th</sup> St. (corner of Book Rd. and 95<sup>th</sup>. Street), Naperville, IL. There we met a group of volunteers that helped us make our Treasure Bears.

More than just a Teddy Bear:

At the December 2<sup>nd</sup>, meeting, I presented to the group a Treasure Bear. Treasure Bears are memories either of our lost children or loved one.

Just the sight of a loved one's favorite shirt, dress, or accessory piece brings back a flood of happy memories. Treasure Bear volunteers help you use these materials to construct a precious bear that carries a new set of memories that can be passed from generation to generation.

No sewing experience necessary. You do not need to know how to sew. The experienced volunteers will walk you through every step of the process-from cutting the material to stuffing your unique Treasure Bear.

What to bring: recommend that you bring a couple of items that can coordinate to use for the construction of your Treasure Bear. Suggested items for adults: Men's large or XL long sleeve shirt, ladies' blouse, jumper or skirt, sweatshirt, pajamas or robe, and denim or corduroy. Suggested items for children or infants: blankets or other linens, 5-10 outfits.

The church will provide: All the necessary sewing equipment, stuffing, materials for the nose and eyes, thread and muslin.

The Treasure Bears sessions are in the spring and fall. The next session is March 3<sup>rd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>, 2012. There is no cost, as this is a Ministry of the Wheatland Salem Church. All they ask, is that you call.

Please call the church if you are interested in attending, so has to have the staff and materials needed for the sessions.

## "I Can't Do It"

As I was reading an old newsletter, I thought about the words "I can't do it". These were the words I had heard over and over again when I was trying to teach my 8-year-old granddaughter how to ride a bike this past weekend. As she kept telling me "I can't do it", I thought back to a time when I said the same words over and over again.

When my son, Paul died twelve years ago in a car accident, I thought to myself that I simply could not go on in life. While I had a younger son at home and a solid marriage, everything dimmed in my life while comparing it to the death of my son. My mind and body were clouded with constant pain and after making it through the first holidays, birthday and anniversary, I thought to myself, "I can't do it" anymore. Simply put, I didn't think any mother or father could continue on living through this devastating time. I read all the grief books, attended a Baltimore County vehicular and homicide support group, visited therapists, attended counseling sessions through my work and counted on friends and family for their support, but the words still rung out in my head-I can't do it anymore.

I honestly thought in the beginning that no one could possibly understand my pain because no one loved a child as much as I had loved my son, but I soon realized I was terribly wrong. After attending the Bereaved Parents support group, I began to see people who were exactly like me. I hated to be part of a group that was full of so much sadness, but I couldn't stay away. Never in my life would I have volunteered to work with a group of bereaved parents unless I had become one myself. Attending these meetings and talking to others very much like myself was where I began my road to recovery.

Everyone has a different timetable for grieving, but for me it was three years to even begin to feel that I could possibly go on with life and not until the fifth year that I decided that I was the only one who could choose happiness for myself. Parents never get over the loss of a child, but they can choose whether or not they want to find happiness once again in their lives. After twelve years I can tell you that I laugh a lot more and especially at myself. I still cry sometimes, but the ravishing pain that constantly

attacks you in the beginning has gone. I also can plan ahead and look forward to a new future, where in the beginning I couldn't plan from one moment to the next. My heart and mind continue to miss my son each day, but I am more thankful than ever that I was able to share time on earth with him for those nineteen years.

So if you are newly bereaved, I just want you to remember that "you can do it" even if you think you can't. If you are constantly swimming upstream against the current of grief, allow yourself time to float. In other words, give yourself a break from all the hard work that grief takes out of you. Floating during difficult times can give you an inner peace that is much needed and will allow you time to renew your strength before you have to swim upstream again and face another holiday, birthday, or special occasion without your child. So bless each and every one of those bereaved parents and just remember that "You Can Do It".

## **Hard Times**

How to hold on and how to let go...How to lose and how to keep...these are hard problems for the bereaved parent.

We want to keep the child in our life, we want to remember the child, we want to save those parts of our life which are tied to the child.

Yet, at the same time, we know that the child is dead – things cannot be as they were before. The memories of good times now bring pain; the memories of the bad times raise guilt and feelings of powerlessness.

The end of the grief process is a resolution of this tension between holding on and letting go.

We can remember and be sad; we can remember and be happy; we can remember and just be.

But it takes a long time for such a resolution to happen and while we are in the process, we find ourselves pulled to one side and then to the other.

Sometimes we want to leave the room exactly as it was. Other times we want to put everything away so nothing reminds us of the child.

Sometimes we want to talk over and over again about the events of the death; other times we want to avoid the topic altogether.

Sometimes, when all we have left of our child is our sadness, we don't want to give up our grief for fear of giving up on our child.

All that is a normal process. We go through it at any death. When our parent dies, the problem is how to hold onto our childhood and youth and yet give up our childhood and youth. So, we find ourselves keeping a bit of our parents in ourselves by becoming a little more like them. I was once talking about this in a class when, suddenly, a woman blurted out, "So that's why I wanted to use the good china so much a year after she died."

It is a lot harder to give up the child and keep the

child at the same time because, when our parents die, we have to lose and keep our past. When our child dies, we have to lose and keep our future.

If we can, for a moment, share with others on the same journey, we can help others find directions and let them help us.

That is what Bereaved Parents is all about. ##

I have been a bereaved parent for 9 years now. I am not an expert but was thinking for this column I would list a few ideas that have brought me relatively safely to this point. You may have heard them all before. They are not part of a magic grief cure, but hopefully some ideas worth thinking about.

- Take one day at a time. In the beginning it may be one minute or hour at a time. Facing the magnitude of our tragedy in small chunks one at a time is just a little easier.
- Honor the memory of your child, in whatever way works for you candles at the cemetery, flowers at the base of a tree; donations in memory of your child; eating your child's favorite food...
- Be open to help from unexpected people. Our angels on earth can sometimes be people we just meet by chance.
- Take time to ponder the mystery of life, the mystery of what we can and cannot see. If you are a believer, explore aspects of your faith. If you are not a believer, explore aspects of our lives which we cannot explain.
- Help others. When we help others we help ourselves. I am thankful for all of the Hinsdale Chapter bereaved parents who have helped me.
- Take care of yourself. Your child wants you to.
- "Accept the things you cannot change." It takes a long time to even get close to acceptance but if you can start thinking in terms of acceptance it may buy you some peace.
